

SYRACUSE WINS IN FINAL QUARTER

Scores Two Touchdowns in Rapid Succession and Beats McGill, 13 to 0.

MONTREAL, Nov. 5.—A forward pass across the goal line by Herbert, in the final period of the Syracuse-McGill game this afternoon gave the Orange team the first score in a game that had gone nearly the full time without either side registering a point. Following the touchdown the Syracuse team again smashed its way down the field to carry the ball over the McGill line just before the game ended, with the Orange leading by 13 to 0.

Six inches of snow covered the gridiron and a crowd of six thousand football fans shivered through the afternoon as a cold wind swept across the field. McGill was playing under American rules for the first time and the players were uncertain about the regulations at many times. As interference is not allowed in the game as played in Canada, they were lost in trying to block the Syracuse players which always were protected by well-planned interference.

Whereas the Orange outfit was far superior on the line at all times, McGill showed a decided superiority over their opponents in the backfield. Flanagan, the Red and White half back, sent punts far over the heads of the Syracuse backs and kept his line out of danger for the greater part of the contest. At running in the open field both Anderson and Flanagan of McGill, were able to outdo the visitors at any stage of the game.

Anderson Stars for Orange.

Anderson, the Orange half back, was the outstanding player on his team, making long gains down the field by smashing plunges through the line. Against a strong defensive line put up by the McGill team he was the only player who could gain consistently and he was called upon to carry the ball, repeatedly.

In the first quarter of the game Syracuse went down the field in a steady march and it appeared as if they would walk right across the line with the ball. When they came within striking distance, however, McGill held like a solid wall and the period ended without any scoring done.

Baillie broke through centre to spoil a placement kick that was being attempted by Herbert and McGill secured the ball on their 20-yard line.

Flanagan punted the ball far down the field and Anderson was brought down on his own 40-yard line with the ball. A moment later the Orange halfback fumbled a catch and Ambridge fell on it, giving McGill possession of it again. Another punt by Flanagan brought the play to the Syracuse 10-yard line and only a series of heavy line plunges on the part of Anderson took the ball out of the danger zone. Once more in possession of the pigskin, the visitors' line showed its superiority and traveled over sixty yards in successive downs, to be once again stopped by McGill when within striking distance of the goal line, and the period ended without any score being recorded.

Gridiron Very Slippery.

The faulty footing prevented any open field plays from working, and several attempted forward passes on the part of the Syracuse team failed. With the forward passes failing to accomplish anything, Herbert reverted to kicking, but at this game he was far outdistanced by the rival backs and had to try line plays again. Flanagan sent high spirals from his toe in fast succession and the play was soon near the Syracuse line. A placement kick attempted by the McGill halfback failed to clear the bar by inches and the ball was brought out to the 20-yard line to be scrimmaged.

Another series of long gains by line plays again brought the ball down into McGill territory. It was a hard fight on the part of both teams and it generally took the full four downs to make the necessary ten yards, but Syracuse, realizing their only hope was in holding the ball away from Flanagan's boot, held on to it desperately and came within twenty yards of their opponent's line when they had to change ends at quarter time.

Three desperate plunges failed to gain the necessary yards for the Orange squad and Herbert sent a long pass forward over the goal line to McRae for a touchdown. An attempted goal by Herbert went wide of the mark.

Syracuse later secured the ball in McGill's territory. Foster made three plunges in succession, each of which counted for long gains and Herbert slipped around the end for a run of twelve yards.

With the ball on the 2-yard line, Foster hit centre three times to gain one yard, and Anderson barely got the pigskin across the line when he plunged through tackle, giving his team a touchdown. Herbert kicked a goal.

The game was nearly over, but it remained for Flanagan to give the spectators the prettiest play of the day. Herbert kicked off, and the McGill halfback, receiving the ball on his own 25-yard line, pivoted his way through a mass of players who were attempting to tackle him, and, without the help of any interference, carried the ball back down the field for a 40-yard gain just as the whistle blew the end of the contest.
