

Students Get Seven Points Last Quarter To Beat Eskimos 13-6

Fred Hess, Former Western Canada College Player, is Outstanding Star, Accounting For All of Varsity's Points in Deciding Session

EDMONTON, Sept. 30.—Coach Wally Sterling's University of Alberta football machine opened its 1929 season auspiciously in the shadows of the provincial seat of learning here Saturday when it triumphed over Edmonton Eskimos in the second game of the Alberta Rugby Football Union schedule by a score of 13 to 6.

Varsity's gridiron warriors broke an old precedent when they turned back the igloo-dwellers Saturday. Many years have passed since the green and gold have emerged with a victory over the Eskis. Even last year, when they won the Western Canada Intercollegiate title they suffered a pair of losses at the hands of the Eskimos but Saturday they revenged themselves fully in the eyes of the large crowd of their supporters that were on hand for the game.

It was a colorful crowd that was on hand when Referee Bill Broadfoot got the battle under way. Freshmen in their initiation garb, undergraduates by the hundreds, and many city followers of the game were in attendance when play commenced, and they were treated to a mighty fine exhibition of the gridiron passtime, that was replete with thrills almost throughout.

Use Forward Pass

There was a lot of good rugby dished up for the patrons and plenty was not so good, but the game was close all the way and was always interesting. It was featured by the continual use of the forward pass by both teams, the Eskimos in particular resorting to the aerial form of attack and the fans were treated to a display that was at times spectacular.

The Eskimos, beaten in their first start the previous week against the Calgary Tigers, appeared to be off on the right foot against the Collegians when they took the lead early in the first quarter on a rouse by Campbell. Varsity took an upward turn later in the period, however, when Stewart galloped over the line for a touchdown which was not converted, putting them into the lead 3 to 1.

Power's Great Run

In the second quarter the Eskis again went out in front on one of the prettiest plays of the afternoon and what is probably the first touchdown to be scored directly from a forward pass since the play was brought into Canadian football was made. Joe Cook, Eskimo quarterback, tossed a beautiful 25-yard pass to Power, who took it on the run and lashed another 35 yards for the try, giving them a 6-1 lead at half time and making it anyone's game.

There was little scoring in the third quarter, Varsity getting the only point of the session when Hall roused Dugan, and the teams went into the last period with the score knotted at six all.

Varsity pressed hard at the start of the fourth quarter and soon took the lead when Freddy Hess booted to touchdown for a point, making the score 7-6. Hess kicked to the Eskifo dead-line a few minutes later for another point to put them further ahead and, towards the last of the period, intercepted an attempted forward pass to rouse over for the touchdown that decided the contest.

Well Worth Victory

Coach Sterling's gridironers were well worth their win on the afternoon's performance. While there was a noticeable weakness in their line, it was probably due to the short time they have had for practice, and the Varsity mentor will probably have that department strengthened in a very short time. Otherwise, the students presented a strong-looking lineup and the predictions that they will go through to another Western Canada Intercollegiate title will probably not be far wrong.

Freddy Hess, last year's captain, was outstanding in the winners' backfield and turned in a fine performance, kicking exceptionally well, and running and passing in fine style. Bill Paulishy, back at Varsity after a two-years' absence, teamed up with Hess and also turned in a nice game, as did Bill Shandro, Boile's Hills and Hayes. Hall

and Captain Ken Thompson performed well on the wing-line.

Too Many Fumbles

The Eskimos, though showing wonderful improvement in the line since the previous Saturday, were again weak on receiving punts and this was probably one of the biggest reasons for their defeat. Time and time again kicks were dropped or fumbled and this gave the Collegians a big advantage. Otherwise, the team shaped up as a real threat. They showed three great line plungers Saturday that should cause plenty of trouble in the provincial union before the season ends, in "Catsy" Mills, Clarence Campbell and Pal Power. These three tipped through the Varsity line time and again, Joe Cook, at quarter, tossed a great number of forward passes and looked good all round.
