

BEACHES' RALLY IN SECOND HALF BEAT MCGILL, 14 TO 11

O.R.F.U. Champions Captured Exhibition Football Tilt After Listless Start

ONSIDE PASS FEATURED Play Met With General Approval—Balmly Beach to Be Reckoned With in Dominion Rugby Play-offs

Balmly Beach, champions of the Senior O.R.F.U. and already qualified for the Dominion play-downs, will have to be reckoned with seriously in eliminations for the Canadian rugby crown this fall. This fact has been presented to local rugby followers previously, but on Saturday some 6,000 Montrealers received tangible evidence of the Beaches' prowess at the Percival Mason Memorial Stadium.

Striking with fury in the second half, after a listless start, the red team's magnificent victory in the defeat of the home and home exhibition between the two leading squads, winning, 14-11, largely through the brilliant efforts of Yip Foster, Captain Scotty Cawwell and Red Moore, their halfback trio, and the sturdy play of a rugged, clean-fighting front line.

The exhibition served a triple purpose. It introduced to Montrealers the famed lot of youngsters who battle in the blue and gold colors of Balmly Beach; it produced the first serious effort here of two teams using the onside pass which is generally favored as a play advocated for adoption in Canadian rugby; and it filled an open date for the two clubs which have important games ahead and needed the football which accrues from such a struggle.

In all three respects the contest was a success. Balmly Beach thoroughly impressed Montrealers; the onside pass seemed to meet with general approval, if the standing ovation of the 6,000 at half-time can be taken as a criterion; and the conflict proved of inestimable value to both teams. It gave the Beaches, who have had little opposition in the O.R.F.U., a chance to measure strength with a first-string squad and it enabled McGill to see just how much the red team will have to improve to come out of the category of two weeks of idleness in the Intercollegiate series.

Undoubtedly the crowd, a record for an exhibition in Montreal, was attracted to witness the onside pass, as it is often called, modified forward pass. In the first half they saw this type of play used frequently by both teams with varying success. Balmly Beach attempted five and completed two for gains of 60 and 12 yards. McGill three and completed one for a gain of 30 yards. Both failed on three attempts.

Curly Taylor and Al Blair, the two regular outside players, were not in uniform, and Charlie Littlefield, inside, watched play draped in dejected. Loving started well in Little's place, but lost his sense of timing in getting the ball out on the end runs and this big department of McGil's play failed. Doherty, who alternated with St. Germain and Lovings, was erratic, and Bruce Spears, generally reliable, snapped poorly. It was a bad snap to Moar which put Balmly Beach in position for the winning touchdown in the third quarter and several times in the last period St. Germain had to reach high to catch the ball for a punt.

Notes of the Game McGill were keen for a win in the last quarter. Captain Jack Little was out on the side line ready to enter the fray, but McGill lost possession of the ball when St. Germain and Doherty got muddled, and the McGill leader did not get into action.

Red Moore caught the popular fancy. This youngster, in 1924 a junior player alongside Yip Foster, in Toronto, played a fearless steady game that was thoroughly appreciated by the red players and the crowd. From remarks made at the supper after the battle, the good feeling was apparently mutual.
