Many autumns ago I saw a world series. To be specific at the risk of seeming archaic, it was in 1943. And the way it has turned out, that was the only world series I ever attended.

Hesitantly, like a man giving in to his wife's plea to make their little all at the bank a joint account, I have just about decided that not being at a world series is more exciting than being

New York was strange and exciting and satisfying. the year I saw the Yankees play the Cards. Perhaps that was the trouble. It was my first visit to New York, and Broadway by night was more intriguing than Bill

Not that I don't recall Joe Gordon's fielding. Or Morton Cooper pitching and winning, with brother Walker Cooper catching, a few hours after their father had died.

Frankie Crosetti was shortstopping rather well, too. And Stan Musial, a blur of speed then who was known by a now forgotten nickname, Donora Greyhound.

But somehow those memories don't pluck at muted strings as they should.

I remember more clearly incidents that happened in other series when I attended via the radio or TV set.

It is probably the same with those fans who will surely be phoning, these next few days, to ask what year Don Larsen pitched the perfect game in the series.

That was in 1956, incidentally, so let's not be hearing that one.

And to forestall a few others (this is Boy Scout week on our block) catcher Mickey Owen missed that third strike in the 1941 series.
