"Fritz" Sandstrom Displays His Old Time Form in Handling Invaders

Bengals Score Five Touchdowns Saturday

Star Quarter Gets Two, McKenzie Two and McKinnon One For Winners

(By Herald Staff Reporter) EDMONTON, Sept. 21.—Uncovering a snappy system of play under the cool direction of Fritz Sandstrom, the Calgary Tigers completely dazzled the Edmonton Eskimos at Renfrew Park here, Saturday afternoon in the opening game of the Alberta Rugby Union, and ran off the field with a 33 to 8 victory.

Sandstrom at quarter, Jerry Seiberling, Bill McLeod and Alex McKenzie were the main stay of the Calgary club, and the line proved to be solid against the attacks of the Igloo dwellers.

The Calgary team worked like a perfect machine and only committed one fumble throughout the engagement, which was witnessed by about 3,000 fans. The weather was ideal for the contest.

For the first and second quarters there was an evenly matched battle, with the Edmonton red shirts standing up well. The third saw the Calgarians come to the front, when Sandstrom bluffed the Eskimos time after time. The Eskimos were fighting hard all the way.

The first attempt at using the forward pass was made in the closing session and the play went for substantial gain. The Bengal tribe time after time Seiberling brought his throwing arm into play and the halves and ends were right on the mark to get his passes.

Calgary's Big Scores The Calgary touchdowns were registered by Sandstrom, who crossed the line twice; McKenzie, who also registered two; and McKinnon. McKenzie's kicking to the dead line was a great asset in gaining points.

Bengals Open Up The Bengals played gingerly for the first two quarters, and then clawed into their opponents without mercy in the third quarter.

Uncovering the forward pass in the final quarter, the play was opened up to a great extent, and the Tigers showed the effects of the coaching of Miller Stewart and Sandstrom, field general of the team. The Edmonton boys were hopeless at this stage of the game.

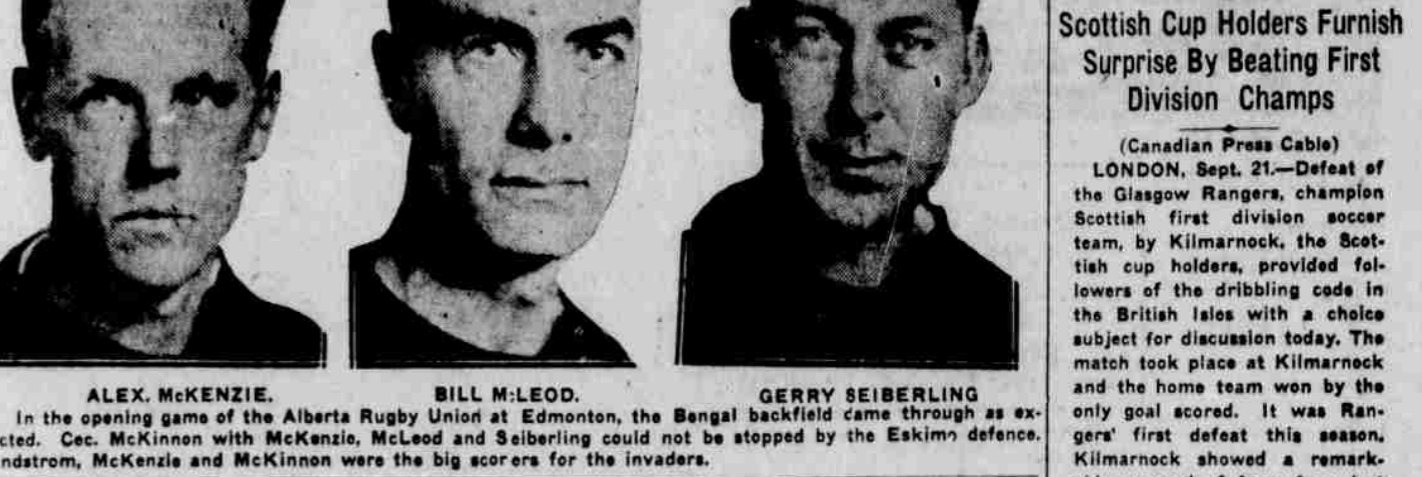

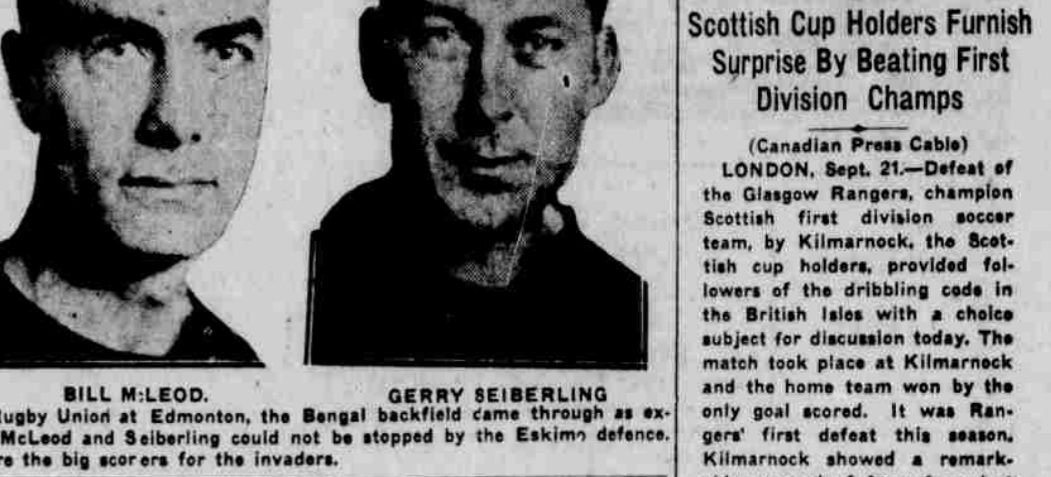

Sharkey not long ago expressed the opinion in the hearing of Philadelphia Tommy that he could lick any Irishman living. This so wrought up Loughran that he immediately shed his coat and offered to prove it then and there. However, there happened to be too many managers around at the time that saw the foolishness of their fighters scrapping for nothing when they could draw down many greenbacks by biding their time.

Word has come from Philadelphia that Tommy has grown an inch in the last six months and that his punching power has increased considerably. This seems a little improbable. The Loughran that fought James J. Braddock at the Yankee Stadium not so long ago was trained down to the light heavyweight limit and he still looked as fat as an over-stuffed sofa.
